

City of Covington connects Cricket Frog Trail and Legion Field



The City of Covington recently completed a paved trail connecting the Cricket Frog Trail with Legion Field. The connector can be found immediately behind the amphitheater in the southwest corner of Legion Field.

"This is a wonderful addition to Newton County's trail network," said Greg Richardson, Newton Trails board chair. "We appreciate Covington's on-going commitment to building and maintaining multi-use trails as well as their partnership."

The project will include an improved sidewalk and steps between Legion Field and the back of the Covington Family YMCA parking lot. "The Covington Family YMCA is excited about the connector trail because it creates off-street access to the YMCA for community members and their families as well as a way for YMCA members exercising individually or in one of our classes to reach the Cricket Frog Trail," said Louly Hay-Kapp, executive director.

"Our goal as a council is complete connectivity and these additions are part of that plan," said City of Covington mayor Ronnie Johnston. "While a lot of users rely on the trail for health and leisure purposes, there is a percentage that relies on the trail for transportation. That might be getting to a job or the grocery store. Regardless of why someone chooses to use it, we want people to be able to traverse the city, exercise, conduct life responsibilities and business without getting in a car."

Ray Holt builds trail kiosk for Eagle Scout service project

Ray Holt has been involved in Scouts since he was six years old. This summer he built an information kiosk along the Eastside Trail near Eastside High School where he is a junior. The project meets the service project requirement for scouts seeking distinction as an eagle scout.

Lee Aldridge, Holt's eagle scout project coach, suggested he build the kiosk. It took him about a month to raise the money needed for materials. Contributions came from friends as well as from local businesses.

Holt's design replicates other kiosks along Newton County trails. Construction was completed in June. Aldridge said, "Ray is an incredible young man, highly intelligent, highly motivated, broadly skilled, and hard working."



Regarding the project, Holt said, "A lot of people helped." Boy Scouts encourages scouts to get help from fellow scouts and others when working on service projects.

Jerry Aldridge, scoutmaster, said that Troop 222 in Covington has had 72 scouts achieve an Eagle Award since 1989, a record of success he attributes to "good help, good parental support, and outstanding scouts."
